Volunteer Role Description

Role Type: Volunteer Conservation Officer x 2

Where: Based at Wildlife Trust Office, Great Cambourne, Cambridgeshire. The role will involve travel to sites across Cambridgeshire.

Start date: End of February 2025

Commitment: Three days per week, ideally Tues – Thurs. A normal working day is from 9am to 5pm with the option of occasional evening/weekend work.

Duration: End February to September 2025

Expenses: Out of pocket expenses for travel will be reimbursed.

Main Objective: Working with the Wider Countryside Team staff, the successful candidates will assist with the practical tasks of species and habitat surveys, habitat management and community engagement.

The responsibilities listed above suggest what may be available to the Volunteer Conservation Officer. The exact work programme will be based upon the specific interests of the successful candidate and work available at the time.

Notes: The Wildlife Trust is a wildlife conservation charity that works for a better future for all kinds of wildlife across Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Northamptonshire. Our mission is to protect and improve habitats and wildlife in our local area as well as helping people to enjoy and understand their local wildlife.

What you can expect: It is expected that the Volunteer Conservation Officers will gain a wide range of skills in the field of nature conservation. Much of this will be from "on the job" experience as well as structured reading and the development of natural history skills in free time. The Wildlife Trust organises an extensive programme of Wildlife Training Workshops run by specialists, of which Volunteer Conservation Officers may attend five free of charge.

Key Responsibilities

- Assist with surveys of habitats such as woodland, grassland, hedgerow and watercourse
- Produce Phase 1 habitat maps using GPS and GIS mapping software
- Assist with the assessment of County Wildlife Sites including undertaking surveys and producing survey reports
- Assist with planning and undertaking species surveys (e.g. water voles, great crested newts, bats, nonnative invasive species, pollinators)
- Participate in practical habitat management tasks
- Assist staff with preparation for volunteer work parties e.g. completing risk assessments, tools maintenance and site preparation work
- Assist with the delivery of a varied and exciting programme of community engagement events.
- Assist with ongoing landowner liaison through the district Nature Networks and Parish Nature Recovery Plans.
- Assist with the County Habitat Survey using UK Habs classification

Training will be offered in the following areas, depending on experience:

- Species identification
- Species and habitat surveying techniques (including Phase 1 Habitat surveys)
- Data analysis
- Applied use of GIS software and GPS
- Habitat management techniques (optional brushcutter use)
- · Community engagement techniques

- First Aid At Work (certificated)
- Health & Safety and Risk Assessments

Other opportunities for gaining experience in this Wildlife Trust may be available, depending on the interests of the individual. Travel expenses will be reimbursed.
